This envelope containing a note and a French 1822 5 franc coin were found in a box of papers in my father's basement. The box belonged to my grandfather John E. Lux. I believe the note was written by John Philip Lux, grandson of Philip Barbier. I believe that John Philip's middle name was in honor of Philip Barbier as well as the name of his grandson Joseph Philip Lux, Dad's brother. The text of the note isn't completely accurate. Philip Barbier died on August 9th 1841 when the Steamship Erie caught fire on Lake Erie just offshore of Silver Creek, NY. Silver Creek is less than halfway to the Port of Erie and so the burning ship was not visible from Buffalo. Philip's body was recovered a few days after the sinking and was returned to Buffalo but his burial place is unknown.

This coin has been in the family since found on the body of helip Barbier Jeby 1842 who drowned in Lake Erie in sight; the shorry Buffalo My. when the ship was destroyed Philip Barbier was the father of Mary Barbier who married Joseph Rus and wan the mother of Johin Phus born in Buffalo My Prog 13th 1863. Tamily record and coin found, on body of Philip Barbier Franchacter of Miling More modern research shows that more than 350 people died in this disaster.
