Mrs. Porter tells us that her father was constantly reading aloud to his children and to visitors descriptions of the great deeds of men. She says the old thrill comes back when she recalls the inflection of her father's voice as he would cry in imitation of the captain: "John Maynard!" and then give the reply. "Aye, aye, sir!"
